As a person with mental disability, Nurul Yusra said it was not easy for her, as she had planned to quit multiple times.

"As a person with mental disability, there is a stigma in society, because I look normal. In fact, I was battling inside, thanks to my lecturers and friends from NGO who were always there for me. I am currently working in a safe space, where I am also treating people with mental disabilities.

"All the patients and trainees under my supervision are also

with mental disability, and I can understand what they feel," she said.

Nurul Yusra who obtained 3.53 Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) said she is passionate in what she is currently doing because she will be able to help those having same issue as her.

"Most persons with mental disabilities such as trauma, anxiety and stress will be having problem in staying in focus in their studies but I am glad for being there for them, helping them in going through it.

"As long as we are channeling our issue on the right direction, it is manageable and even give us a better understanding in tackling any situations in the future," she said.
