"Rafida is a bright child, hailing from the blessed land of Sandakan.

"Her exam results at Labuan Matriculation College were very impressive, and she is currently pursuing accounting studies at UMS. Why is Rafida's issue so close to my heart? Because on the same day, I also sent my eldest child to university.
