Three other programmes were also developed under the Tenth Malaysia Plan to provide deserving postgraduate students, namely MyMaster, MyPhD and MyPhD Industry with financial facilities.

"I hope UMS' centre for postgraduate studies could further diversify the programmes being offered to cater for the need and demand in the country.

"In a wider context, the university is also thinking about a strategy to attract existing and new students to continue their

studies to postgraduate and not stop at the first degree level.

"For this, a benchmarking process is also required for all the programmes we have to ensure they are of a high quality and competitive enough to produce experts that are highly knowledgeable," he added.

The university received a total of 599 new postgraduate students for its new 2012/2013 session, including from Brunei, China, Indonesia, India, Iraq, New Zealand and Sudan, apart from the majority of Malaysian students.
