Yesterday, it inked a memorandum of Understanding with Universitas Sebelas Maret (UNS) and Universitas Negeri Semarang (Unnes) to pave the way for this research.

This also marked UMS' first collaboration with the two universities.

At a ceremony here, UMS Vice-Chancellor Prof Dr Mohd Harun

Abdullah expressed hope that the School of Art Studies would come up with a good action plan to benefit both countries. The school is representing the university in signing the MoU.

He said the school's Borneo heritage research unit, for instance, could study and share the various creative, visual and musical arts of ethnic communities in the state.
