260, 30 percent were presented

by international participants," he said.

He added that for this year's conference, the number of papers presented increased to 356, which was almost 40 percent

"What makes this conference more exciting is the increase in the number of international papers from 30 percent previously to 45 percent for this current conference. We have more student presenters compared to lecturers by 175 to 157" he said
