Higher learning institutions to help develop agri sector Larissa Lumandan

KOTA KINABALU: The State government will continue to support the involvement of

higher education institutions to develop the agriculture sector.

"Activities such as shared modern technology and research are effective in contributing to the development of skilled human resources and the agriculture industry in Sabah," said Deputy Chief Minister cum Agriculture and Food Industries Minister Datuk Seri Yahya Hussin. In the past, the agriculture industry was considered as a low productivity and traditional sector. However, the sector, he said, was now one of the huge contributors to the gross domestic product.

Therefore, he urged the industry to continue collaborating with higher education

institutes to develop the sector.

"The Ministry also encourages more graduates to venture into the field of agriculture entrepreneurship as part of the effort to develop the industry," he said when launching the Universiti Malaysia Sabah (UMS) Industry Centre of Excellence (ICoE) as well as the ICoE conference at Pan Pacific Sutera Harbour here, Monday.

UMS Vice-Chancellor Professor Datuk Dr Mohd Harun Abdullah, meanwhile, said agriculture is one of the university's focuses as it is one of the catalysts of the nation's economy.

Besides that, the sustainability of the sector also ensures food sufficiency in the country, depending less on imported products.

"UMS will be signing a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Federal Agricultural Marketing Authority (Fama) on Dec 4 in conjunction with Fama's 50th anniversary," he added.
