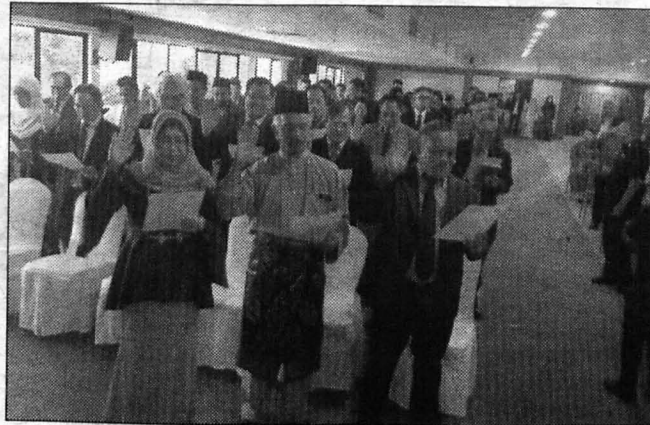


Graft busters moving in for 'big catch'



"It (arrests) is coming; it would not be this month. It is likely to be next month we carry out the operations involving a bigger personality," he told reporters after witnessing the corruption-free pledge by University Malaysia Sabah staff here.

Asked if the person on their radar was a "big fish," he replied, "Wait and see, we are still gathering our evidence."

Last month, Sazali had also indicated that the state MACC was likely to move in senior officials at two government agencies in Sabah.

UMS vice chancellor Prof. Dr. D Kamarudin D Mudin led the signing and oath to pledge to be free of

corruption at the ceremony on Friday.

He said the oath and pledge to be corruption free was a voluntary action taken by the leadership of organisations.

He said that the leadership and members in their individual capacity would hold each of them accountable and responsible for carrying out their duties and to stop them from engaging in any corruption misconduct.

Earlier, Sazali called on civil servants who have pledged and signed to be corrupt-free to take it seriously.

He said it must be translated into actions and should remain in every government staff who has taken the pledge.
