UMS wants academic links with University of Philippines

KOTA KINABALU: Universiti Malaysia Sabah (UMS) is looking forward to have a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with University of the Philippines.

According to UMS vice chancellor Professor Datuk Dr Harun Abdullah in his welcoming speech at the University of the Philippines Concert Chorus held at UMS Recital Hall near here on Tuesday night, they hoped to venture into the MoU not only in the fields of music, culture and arts but also beyond the looks of social sciences and humanities.

He explained that academic linkages as such enhances the university's academic mission and visions.

"UMS is actively involved and committed towards quality enhancement in our delivery system particularly in the academic field. The university has developed academic collaborations and understandings with universities at both national and international levels, thus placing UMS in the eyes of the world," he said.

Meanwhile, also present to grace the event were wife of the Head of State Toh Puan Norlidah RM Jasni, Philippine Ambassador to Malaysia, J. Eduardo Malaya, Community Development and Consumer Affairs Minister Datuk Jainab Ahmad Ayid and Special Duties Minister Datuk Teo Chee Kang.

Eduardo, in his speech, thanked UMS for opening its door to hold the concert within its venue and the presentation that night marked the start of cultural collaborations between both UMS and the University of the Philippines.
